THE DAVID CLOVER FESTIVAL OF SINGING

Dr. David Clover came to Sheffield in 1966 having been appointed as the city's Music Adviser to the Education Department. It was one of the earliest residential courses for music teachers and its daily choral sessions, organised by David, which brought the first members of the Sheffield Teachers' Choir (as it was then known) together in 1968.



Following David's untimely death in 1979, The Teachers' Choir committee at the time decided that there should be a fitting and lasting tribute and memorial to his work. The result, in 1979, was the establishing of The David Clover Vocal Prize, the first competition being held in 1980. The David Clover Vocal Prize later became The David Clover Competition for Singers, and in 2010 was re-named The David Clover Festival of Singing. The original Vocal Prize provided an opportunity for singers to perform songs of their own choice with a view to being helped and encouraged by experienced judges of singing, and that ethos is still as strong as it ever was.

The Vocal Prize started in a small way with only two classes for those of secondary school age. Since its inception, it has grown into a competitive event of worth, high standing, credibility and stature in the eyes of discerning

musicians not only in and around the city of Sheffield, but also nationally. It has also proved itself a worthy vehicle of encouragement and support for young singers, but the Festival is now open to all singers from the age of nine, and its chief objective is to foster this branch of music making which was ever one of Dr. Clover's greatest loves - singing. He strongly maintained, as others have done, that everyone has a musical instrument which can be developed - the voice - and much of his work was devoted to fostering the use of young voices whether as soloists or choralists. He believed that the voice deserved equal status with other musical instruments.

Over the years, internationally famed singers and teachers of singing have adjudicated at the Festival including Constance Shacklock (President from 1985-1999), Marjorie Thomas, Jean Allister, Rae Woodland, Nigel Perrin, Mollie Petrie (President from 1999-2013, and the first Patron from 2013) and Mark Wildman (Vice President from 1999-2013, and The President from 2013).

Previous winners include Elizabeth Watts (international soprano and Vice-President), Ella Taylor (BBC Radio 2 Choirgirl of the Year 2010) and many others (including Cari Searle, Jessica Greaves, Harriet Eyley, Anna Harvey and John Savournin) who have joined the singing professions. Once the annual Festival has ended, The City of Sheffield Teachers' Choir is always delighted to invite singers from the Festival to share in its concerts when possible.

The City of Sheffield TEACHERS' CHOIR

The City of Sheffield Teachers' Choir was formed on Thursday 7 November, 1968 by Sheffield's then Music Adviser, Dr. David Clover. It was a direct result of the daily choral sessions of his initial residential music course held at the Hayes Conference Centre, Swanwick. This was the first time that Sheffield music teachers had ever come together in this way and it was a historic occasion for Sheffield music. The choir's first performance was the Festival of Lessons and Carols in Sheffield Cathedral during Christmastide 1968. For eleven years the choir flourished under David Clover's baton, raising much money for children's charities, both local and national, and giving opportunities for those connected, at that time, with the education service in Sheffield to come together and sing for the sheer joy of singing. Since his death in January 1979 the choir has continued to perform both at home and abroad. It celebrated its fortieth anniversary in 2008 with a concert at St. John's Church, Ranmoor, on Friday 7 November.

The repertoire is wide. Over the years performances have included Mozart's *Requiem*, Dvořák's *Mass in D*, Vivaldi's *Gloria*, Bach's *Magnificat*, Haydn's *Nelson*, *Harmoniemesse and Maria Theresa Masses*, sacred music by various composers, church services, Stainer's *Crucifixion*, Maunder's *Olivet to Calvary*, William Lloyd Webber's *The Saviour* and *The Divine Compassion*, concert versions of Gilbert and Sulivan operettas, opera choruses, part songs, spirituals, folk songs and songs from the shows, as well as Festivals of Lessons and Carols. Venues have included Sheffield's City Hall, its two cathedrals, the Firth Hall (Sheffield University), local churches, school halls, churches in Derbyshire villages, the 'Bronte' village of Haworth, the village of Castleton, Chatsworth House, St. John's College, Cambridge, Fountains Abbey, Ely Cathedral, Wakefield Cathedral, Liverpool's Anglican Cathedral and York Minster. The choir sang in Bochum, as part of the 50th anniversary of the town-twinning with Sheffield and in Dortmund, Germany, in October 2000. In March 2005 the Teachers' Choir hosted the Dublin City Council Choir and shared an extremely successful concert with them. October 2005 saw the Teachers' Choir singing again with the Dublin Choir, this time in Dublin's City Hall and also performing with them in a 2nd concert raising almost €5000 towards the building of a new hospice in Dublin.

Lesley Garrett CBE

Patron of the City of Sheffield Teachers' Choir and the David Clover Festival of Singing

Lesley Garrett was born in South Yorkshire and studied first with Vivien Pike and later, at the Royal Academy of Music with Joy Mammen with whom she continues to study. Her operatic career began at Opera North with Sophie, Werther and Susanna, The Marriage of Figaro. She returned to the Company in 2013 as Elle, La Voix Humaine. At English National Opera she has sung roles in Xerxes, Ariodante, The Cunning Little Vixen, Don Giovanni, The Magic Flute, The Mikado and Un Ballo in Maschera, working with Charles Mackerras, Mark Elder, Jonathan Miller, Nicholas Hytner, Richard Jones, David Alden and David Pountney amongst others. Other engagements include: Servilia La Clemenza di Tito (Geneva); The Merry Widow (Royal Opera House, Covent Garden debut); Rosina The Barber of Seville (ENO) Hanna Glawari The Merry Widow and Chorus (WNO) and Despina Cosi for Garsington Opera. She performed My Fair Lady in the Hollywood Bowl with Jonathan Pryce and In the West End, she starred in The Sound of Music and Carousel. Lesley has recorded fourteen solo CD albums, winning gold and platinum discs and also the coveted Gramophone Award. Her most recent operatic recording was Despina on Charles Mackerras's recording of Così fan tutte and her most recent solo album, A



North Country Lass, was released in April 2012. Her countless television appearances include three of her own record-breaking television series Lesley Garrett Tonight and the Lesley Garrett Show, as well as many other programmes, including Strictly Come Dancing and Who do You Think You Are.

Internationally, Lesley has performed throughout Europe, the USA, Australia, Russia, Brazil, Malaysia, Taiwan and South Korea. Recent engagements include concerts and recitals in Aldeburgh, Glasgow and at the Harrogate International Festival. She was awarded the CBE for her services to music in 2002, is a Fellow of the RAM and holds Honorary Doctorates from both Universities of Sheffield and from the Open University. In 2015 she appeared in David Pountney's specially devised production Chorus with WNO and in the summer sang Despina Cosi fan tutte for Garsington Opera. She also toured the UK with her new retrospective show, An Audience with Lesley Garrett and again last year. On 2016 Lesley created the role of Val in Opera North's world premiere production of Marc Simpson's Pleasure. She appeared at the King's Lynn and Stratford on Avon Festival, performed with the RPCO at Cadogan Hall and performed at the Belfast Proms in the Park. Lesley was special guest on Radio 4's Saturday Live and Radio 3's 'In Tune' at Christmas. Lesley was a featured guest on BBC TV's coverage of the Queen's 90th birthday celebrations from Buckingham Palace.

Professor Mark Wildman FRAM FRSA

President of the City of Sheffield Teachers' Choir and the David Clover Festival of Singing Adjudicator at the 2017 David Clover Festival of Singing

Mark received his early musical education at The King's School, Gloucester and as a chorister in Gloucester Cathedral. Later on he studied at The Royal Academy of Music where he was awarded the Westmorland Scholarship, the Recital Diploma and the Frederick



Slinn Fellowship. In 1976, whilst still a student at the RAM, he won a Choral Exhibition at St. George's Chapel, Windsor Castle, where he sang for three years. Mark has travelled throughout Europe, Scandinavia, the British Isles and the USA, where as well as works from the standard repertoire, engagements have included Walton's Belshazzar's Feast, Mahler's Symphony of a Thousand, Elgar's The Kingdom, Stravinsky's Les Noces and Pulcinella and Rachmaninov's The Bells.

In 1976 Mark sang in the first of a series of performances of the complete Church Cantatas of J.S. Bach. To date he has performed nearly 200 of these including the solo cantatas *Ich habe genug* and *Ich will den Kreuzstab gerne tragen*. He has sung with most of Britain's foremost orchestras, at the Promenade concerts and at a number of British and European Festivals. In recital, Mark has a wide repertoire ranging from the works of Purcell, Boyce and Arne to those of Roger Steptoe, Philip White, Arthur Wills and Giles Swayne, of whose works he has given first performances. He combines a busy performing career with that of a Professor of Singing at the Royal Academy of Music where he was appointed Head of Vocal Studies in 1991. He is a much

travelled adjudicator and is an examiner for the Associated Board of the Royal Schools of Music. He was elected a Fellow of the Royal Academy of Music in 1994 and a fellow of the Royal Society of Arts in 1995.

Gaynor Keeble B.Ed (Hons) ARAM ARCM ALCM

Adjudicator at the 2017 David Clover Festival of Singing

Gaynor Keeble won scholarships to the University of Warwick and the Royal Academy of Music. She was awarded a Countess of Munster Award and has been a semi-finalist in both the Kathleen Ferrier and the Belvedere International Opera Competition. On leaving the

RAM she joined the Welsh National Opera where she performed and covered many roles including Carmen, Meg Page (Falstaff), Maddalena (Rigoletto), Berta (Barber of Seville), Marcellina (Marriage of Figaro), Flora and Annina (La Traviata), Ragonde (Count Ory).

Roles with the English Touring Opera include Marcellina, Tisbe, (La Cenerentola), Marchese (Daughter of the Regiment), Baba the Turk (Rake's Progress), with other roles including Buttercup and Hebe (HMS Pinafore) at the Royal Festival Hall and Kate (Pirates of Penzance) D'Oyly Carte Opera at Queen's Theatre, West End. Gaynor has made numerous recordings which have included the Councillor's Wife (Osud) conducted by Sir Charles Mackerras for EMI, Hebe (HMS Pinafore), Patience, Yeomen of the Guard for TER records, and has also performed for the Royal Opera House, Opera North, Mid-Wales Opera, European Chamber Opera and Opera Interludes.



Having worked with Orchestras such as the City of Birmingham Symphony Orchestra, London Mozart Players, London Bach Orchestra, Northern Sinfonia, The Philharmonia, Royal Philharmonic and the Vivaldi Concertante, Gaynor's concert repertoire has included Verdi Requiem, Mozart Requiem, Elijah, Dream of Gerontius and Vivaldi Gloria.

Vivien Pike Hon. D. Mus GRSM ARMCM LGSM FRSA

Vivien studied music at the Royal Manchester/Royal Northern College of Music after previously studying medical sciences. She graduated with teaching and performing diplomas and a silver medal. Vivien has wide experience as a recitalist and soprano soloist with many choral societies. She has sung in choirs from the age of 7 and is a former member of the BBC Northern Singers. She is vocal coach for several choral societies.



Over the years as a peripatetic teacher of singing in Yorkshire, she has taught hundreds of young singers, one of the first being Lesley Garrett. Her choirs have won many prizes in national and international competitions and have enjoyed tours to Italy, Germany, Ireland, Australia (representing UK at the first Melbourne International Choral Festival), Canada and USA, Finland and Estonia. Her female choir celebrated 30 years of high standard singing in 2009. Vivien is in great demand for solo singing and choral workshops and has worked with singers in Sweden, Latvia, Ireland, New Zealand and Estonia. She has lectured in Latvia and Slovenia and recently as a visiting professor at the Estonian Academy of Music. Her international jury work includes the World Choir Games in Linz and Graz, festivals in Malta, Italy, Germany, Ireland, Jersey and is currently the UK representative on the World Choir Council. She is an external examiner of singing at degree level and a former visiting lecturer/examiner in choral conducting at Huddersfield University.

She was awarded an Honorary Doctorate by Sheffield Hallam University in 2006 for her work with singers nationally and internationally and is a Churchill Fellow, researching the Cultural Influences on Voice Development in Sweden, Finland and Estonia. She has recently been elected a Fellow of the Royal Society of Arts and was awarded a Fellowship of the British and International Federation of Festivals in 2013. She has been a BIFF adjudicator for more than 30 years.

- (D) 1 or 2 art songs (excluding A) written during the 20th or 21st centuries

The **Don Greenfield Trophy**, given by Hallam Choral Society, will be awarded for the best performance from Classes 8 or 9. This award is in memory of the life and work of Don Greenfield, conductor for many years of the Hallam Choral Society and a former member of the City of Sheffield Teachers' Choir.

The **Doug Crossland Memorial Shield**, given by Worrall Male Voice Choir in memory of Doug Crossland, its conductor from 1971 to 1995, will be awarded to the most promising female singer between the ages of 16 and 21 in any appropriate class.

The **Constance Shacklock Memorial Rose Bowl**, given by Ralph Green in memory of Constance Shacklock, who was President of the City of Sheffield Teachers' Choir and the David Clover Festival of Singing from 1985 to 1999, will be awarded for the most outstanding operatic performance during the Festival Weekend.

The **Kathleen Walker Award**, in memory of Kathleen Walker, who was a founder member of the City of Sheffield Teachers' Choir, and a musical director of several operatic societies in Sheffield, will be awarded for the most outstanding performance in Songs from the Shows Classes 22 to 24.

The **City of Sheffield Teachers' Choir Silver Salver and Prize**, given by Ann Durrant, who was a member of the City of Sheffield Teachers' Choir for over twenty years, will be awarded for the most outstanding performance by a winner from Non-Recital Classes 8 to 24.

The **Michael Peaker Memorial Trophy** is given by Worrall Male Voice Choir in memory of Michael Peaker, of his contribution as accompanist and conductor to the choir, and as organist at St. Matthias's Church, Stocksbridge. The award will be given for the most outstanding performance, by anyone aged 21 or under, of an aria from an oratorio, or of a sacred song, during the Festival Weekend.

The **Edith and Ronald Batty Salvers**, given by Valerie and Geoff Littledyke in memory of Valerie's parents, will be presented to the most promising female and male singers respectively, aged 15 or under, in any appropriate class.

The **Petrie Rose Bowl**, given by our first Patron and previous President, Mollie Petrie, who was always a great devotee of the English language, will be awarded to the winner of Class 25: English Words and Song.

The **Mollie Petrie Memorial Award**, given by Ralph Green in memory of Mollie Petrie, who was President of the City of Sheffield Teachers' Choir and the David Clover Festival of Singing from 1999 and then the first Patron until 2016, will be awarded for the most outstanding performance of a song with words by Shakespeare from any class during the Festival Weekend.

The **Dore Male Voice Choir Trophy and Prize** will be awarded annually to the winners of Class 26, Ensemble Class, in memory of Paul Green, their conductor and accompanist for many years.

Elizabeth Watts Hon. D. Mus Vice-President

James Kirkwood LRAM LTCL ARCM Vice-President

On David's death in January 1979 he took over the conductorship of Sheffield Teachers' Choir and with the support of Rupert Norris and the choir committee, set up 'The David Clover Festival of Singing' as a lasting tribute and memorial to this man who had done so much to direct James' future career as teacher, advisory teacher and finally adviser for music to the Sheffield L.E.A. - a post David Clover himself had held until his death.

Richard Clover LTCL FASC Vice-President

Richard (the younger son of David Clover), a former chorister of Sheffild Cathedral, like David, went on to study singing at Trinity College of Music, London. Until his retirement in September 2013 Richard was senior Layclerk with the choir of Ely Cathedral, a position he held for 27 years. He has sung as a soloist or member of a choir in many of the great cathedrals, churches and concert halls of England, Europe, Canada and the USA. Richard was co-founder of the close harmony group 'shades of blue'. During his career he has made numerous appearances on Radio and Television. He currently holds the position of Technical Manager at Ely Cathedral. He is also co-founder and Technical Manager for the recording company *Lantern Productions*. Apart from supporting the Festival in person when he can, Richard is responsible for running and maintaining the Festival website along with compiling and type setting the Festival programme and all other related Festival literature.



Ralph Green ARCM Vice-President

Ralph Green was born in Oldham and was educated at Chadderton Grammar School. He owes much of his earliest musical experience to Marian Barnett with whom he studied piano and organ at Macedonia URC in Failsworth, and to the Free Trade Hall in Manchester, where he regularly attended the Halle Concerts and sang from its platform in the choir at school speech days. He went to Sheffield in 1966 to train as a teacher of Music and Mathematics at the then City of Sheffield College of Education, and remained to pursue a career in teaching Music in secondary schools at CSE, GCE, GCSE and A-levels which lasted 37 years. His teaching experience extended into the



public examination sector by becoming a Moderator for GCSE Music and he attained the ARCM Diploma in School Music Teaching in 1982. He retired in 2006. While still a student he started to conduct the College Operatic Society and became a member of Opera 14 (later to become part of The South Yorkshire Opera Company). In 1972 Ralph was appointed Musical Director of the Southey Musical Theatre Company, continuing his penchant of music in the theatre. This was a position he held for twenty two years, and he has been SMTC's President since 2002. His love of choral music resulted in his joining the City of Sheffield Teachers' Choir as a singer in 1974, becoming its secretary in 1984 and its conductor in 1986; and in singing with the Sheffield Chorale since 1981. His membership of the

Teachers' Choir led to a huge commitment and involvement in the David Clover Festival of Singing which was established in 1979. In the earlier days of the Festival he adjudicated in the preliminary selection rounds of the recital classes and in 2016 he was a member of the adjudicating panel at the first Singers' Platform element of the Festival. Also, in 2016, he was honoured and privileged to be made a Vice-President of the Teachers' Choir and the David Clover Festival after serving the Festival for over 30 years.

Linda Wareham BA ARCM Official Accompanist

Linda studied music at Bretton Hall, gaining a Certificate of Education, then continued her piano studies in London under Vera Yelverton gaining the ARCM Diploma. She participated in concerts at Alexandra Palace, the Purcell Room and the Queen Elizabeth Hall, also winning several London music festival prizes. In Oxford, and now Sheffield, she has taught piano privately, was accompanist for the City of Oxford Choir and is accompanist for Sheffield Chorale. She has played extensively as accompanist for diploma exams and festival classes. Linda performs as a duo with John Cooper (violin).





Tim Kennedy Official Accompanist

Tim studied music at Gonville and Caius College, Cambridge, and is now a freelance musician based in Manchester. As well as being an accompanist, he also works as a professional singer, vocal coach and organist. He is a staff repetiteur for young singers at the Royal Northern College of Music.
